# 2022 Goals & Objectives

## **GOAL AND OBJECTIVE 2 - DEVELOPMENT OF DEPARTMENTAL RECRUITMENT UNIT**

A sustained and formalized departmental recruitment unit will be developed. The unit will be responsible for creating approved recruitment flyers, attending job fairs and recruitment events. Once a potential candidate is identified, members of the unit will be available to provide guidance throughout the hiring process.

## **GOAL AND OBJECTIVE 3 - CREATION OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY CALLS FOR SERVICE**

A committee will be created to study the calls for service response of the Irondequoit Police Department. This committee will be responsible to determine the best practice for car assignments/dispatching and staffing of the department.

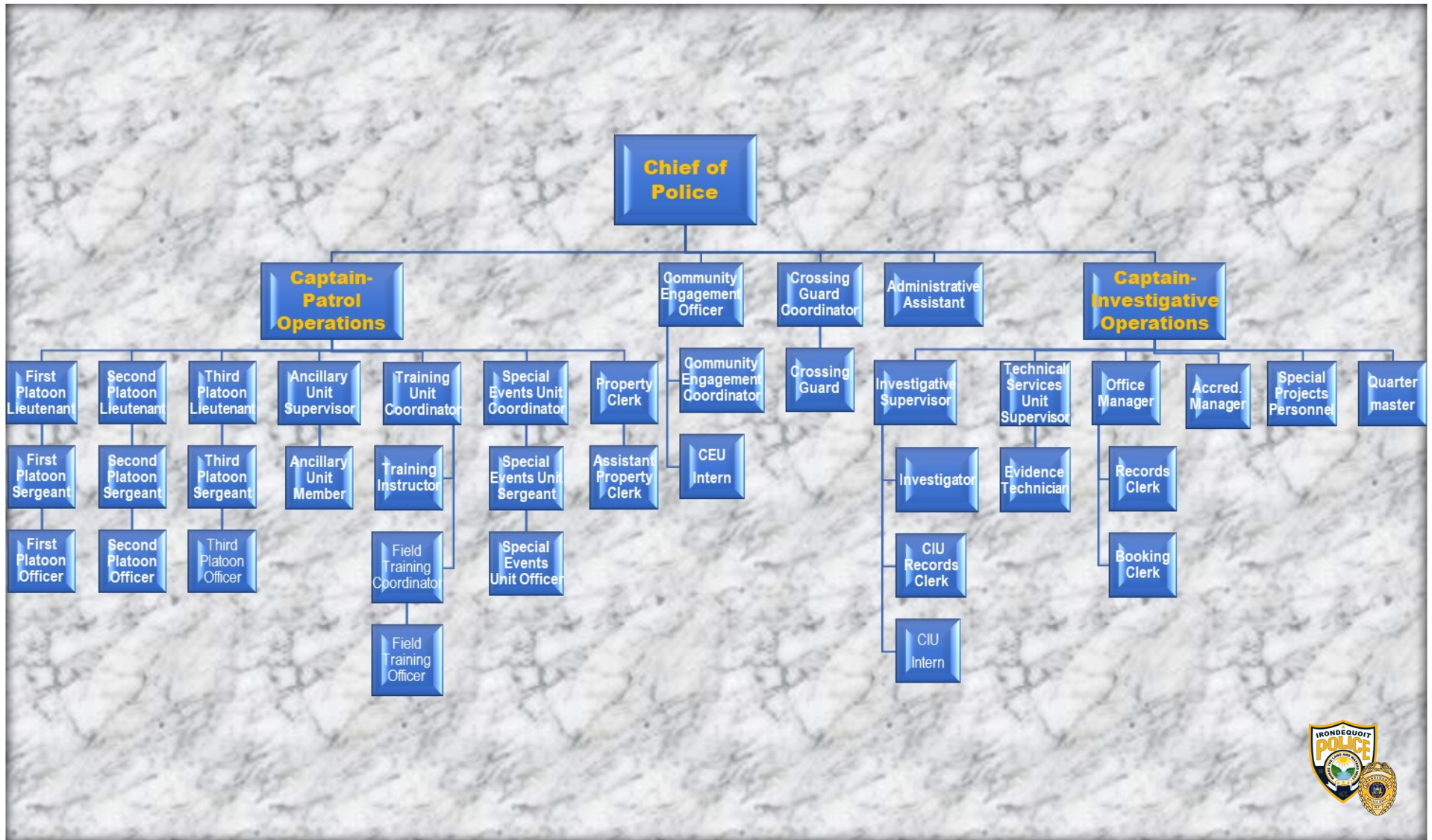
## **GOAL AND OBJECTIVE 4 - ENHANCED TRAINING**

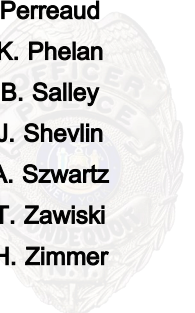

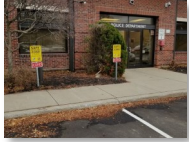

## S.M.A.R.T. Camera Program (Surveillance, Mapping, and Reporting Technology)

With the proliferation of privately owned cameras such as the Ring, Nest, Arlo, and more, the Irondequoit Police Department has partnered with community homeowners & businesses in our community to share their camera footage should a crime occur nearby. Privately owned camera systems have proven invaluable to IPD's officers and investigators. Video obtained from these camera systems has helped the Irondequoit Police Department to identify suspects, vehicles, and other crucial pieces of evidence, leading to the successful clearance of many crimes.

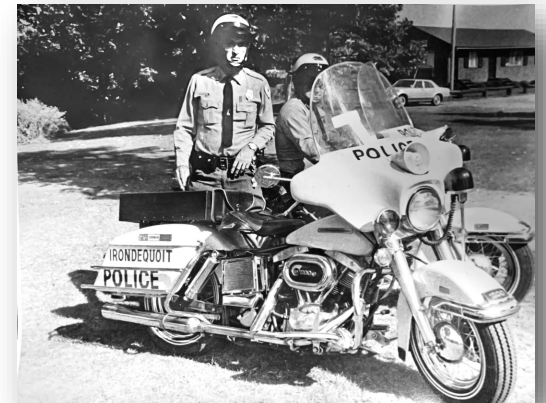

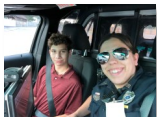
- 90 archers in the program

## Adopt-a-School



The Irondequoit Police Department's Adopt-a-School program provides a meaningful avenue for school children to interact one-on-one with law enforcement. IPD officers are assigned a school and do a reading visit each month.

## Internship Program



This program gives interns a comprehensive view of the Irondequoit Police Department and law enforcement in general. In 2021, two individuals participated in the program. Our interns receive college credits and/or hourly pay. The interns in the 2021 program attended Monroe Community College and Eastern Monroe Community College.

## Caution Kids Campaign



The Caution Kids Campaign was developed by the IPD to raise public awareness of the potential consequences when motorists fail to obey traffic regulations that relate to school buses. School bus operators are encouraged to report problem locations and offending vehicles to the Irondequoit Police Department. The registered owner of the offending vehicle is then notified of the violation by letter and advised of potential consequences for violation of the law. Locations that are identified as problem areas by school bus operators are monitored by police officers.

## Police Chaplain Program



Father Joseph DeMaio and Father Don Wollschleger serve as chaplains to the Irondequoit Police Department. The IPD also partnered with the Flower City Chaplain Corps. Chaplains promote the safety and stability of the community by providing pastoral care to first responders. The chaplains also join IPD officers on ride-alongs, which provide an opportunity for conversation, support, and a means to learn about the role of a police officer in today's society.

# Safe & Secure Drug Disposal

### Prescription Drug and Sharps Drop Off

In addition to the DEA Drug Take Back Day events, the IPD also has a prescription drug and sharps drop box located at the police department where individuals can drop off drugs safely and anonymously.



### DEA National Take Back Day



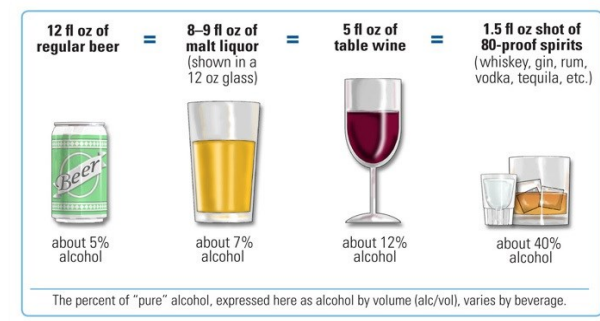
The Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) National Prescription Drug Take Back Day events provide easy, anonymous opportunities to remove medicines in the home that are highly susceptible to misuse, abuse, and theft. The National Prescription Drug Take Back Day addresses a crucial public safety and public health issue. According to the 2018 National Survey on Drug Use and Health, 9.9 million

Americans misused controlled prescription drugs. The study shows that a majority of abused prescription drugs were obtained from family and friends, often from the home medicine cabinet. The IPD participates in the DEA's Take Back Day events in an effort to provide an opportunity for residents to properly dispose of unused drugs.

### Fundamentals of Alcohol Intoxication Recognition Program

This program is a collaborative effort designed to educate Irondequoit business owners who hold a NYS liquor license and their employees on the following:

- Recognize intoxicated patrons
- Properly identify patrons who may be underage
- Monitor patrons so as to not allow alcoholic beverages to be delivered to underage patrons
- Recognize fraudulent documents when presented as identification



### Drug-Free Irondequoit Coalition



The Irondequoit Police Dept. is a founding member of the Drug-Free Irondequoit Coalition (DFI) that has taken a proactive position on education, information and awareness associated with risk behaviors. This community-based coalition has focused on information sharing associated with vaping, drug use, and alcohol abuse.

D-FI attends many community events with a staffed information booth, provides free Narcan training, and conducts "Hidden In Plain Sight" displays to educate the public on the methods used to hide substances that can be harmful to an individual and has sponsored community forums on this important topic. This coalition has a broad level of support from government officials, PTSA reps, educators and school administrators, parents and students.

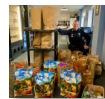
## Willow Domestic Violence Center of Greater Rochester

In 2021, the police department partnered with the Rochester U.S. Border Patrol and collected Thanksgiving dinner food items for the Irondequoit Community Cupboard to distribute to local families in need.

## The Autism Council of Rochester



The Irondequoit Police Department and The Autism Council of Rochester continues its partnership to bring awareness to autism as well as raise funding for law enforcement autism training programs.

## Pirate Toy Fund



The Irondequoit Police Department is proud to be a part of the Pirate Toy Fund's effort to raise money and gift donations for children throughout Monroe County. In 2021, Chief Laird along with local law enforcement leadership loaded up the vehicle trunks and helped deliver donated gifts to the Pirate Toy Fund.



## Shop with a Cop

The IPD's "Shop with a Cop" program is sponsored by the Irondequoit Nightstick Club, PBA, Irondequoit Rotary, American Legion Post 134, and Summit Federal Credit Union. In 2021, the program was restructured due to the ongoing pandemic restrictions. Rather than having the children shop with the officers in person, the IPD purchased and wrapped gifts for 16 children who attend Irondequoit schools and the kids stopped by the IPD to pick up their presents. This annual program provides each child with \$100 to purchase Christmas gifts that they otherwise would not have the opportunity to receive.

"The Do the Right Thing Awards program has been part of the Rochester Police Department (RPD) since 1995. The goal of Do the Right Thing is to foster positive relationships between local law enforcement and youth in the community. The Do the Right Thing Awards program recognizes youth for their bravery, courage and valor, such as volunteering, aiding law enforcement or other first responders, acts of heroism, leadership and positive role model behavior. The award distinguishes school-aged children who strive to make good choices, do well in school, give back to their community, or demonstrate a "turn-around" or improvement in their behavior, and to publicly highlight these students and their stories in the media to show that good kids are newsworthy." The Irondequoit Police Department regularly attends awards ceremonies that feature students from Irondequoit schools.

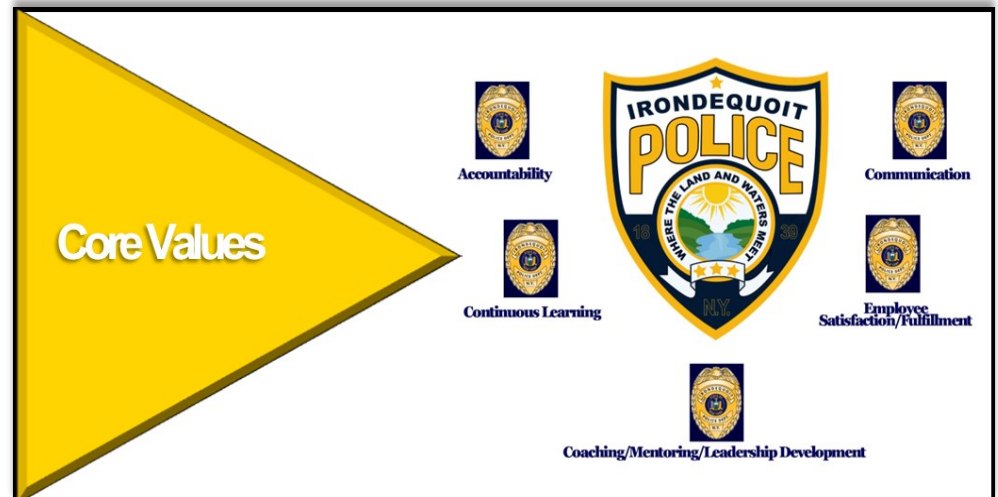
## Special Events Unit

The Irondequoit Police Department's Special Events Unit officers volunteered 116.50 hours of service to the town in 2021. The Special Police has an authorized strength of 15 members. Special Police Volunteers are a vital resource to the Irondequoit Police Department. Special Police Volunteers assist the Irondequoit Police Department and the community with special events throughout the Town of Irondequoit. A liaison officer from IPD is assigned to supervise and guide the activities of the Special Police and also to provide training throughout the calendar year. Training consists of conflict resolution, radio use and procedure, traffic control, crowd control, and officer safety, as well as other topics as deemed relevant by the department.

## IPD Records Division

The Records Division is an integral part of the Irondequoit Police Department. The Records staff provides support to the officers, the Irondequoit Town Court, District Attorney's Office, DJCS, and many other entities that require assistance from the department. They are upheld to a high level of confidentiality, strict regulations, and must qualify to use law enforcement databases. They receive, enter, disseminate, file, and maintain criminal and vehicle information that is necessary to archive, and provide clerical support 24 hours a day, six days a week to the officers.

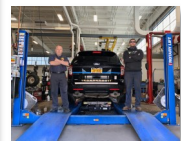
## IPD Property Unit

In 2021, the Property Unit logged 2,495 items of non-agency property and evidence. 178 were drug/narcotic pieces and 133 were firearms. The Irondequoit Police Department Prescription Drug Drop Off Program also collected 865.5 pounds of prescription drugs. A total of 31 items were auctioned, yielding \$1,125.50, which was deposited into the "Town Account". A total of 393 items were returned to owners, including \$711.59 of currency. The IPD Property Unit destroyed 1,243 items - including narcotics and weapons - at the Covanta Energy Incineration Facility in Niagara Falls.

## IPD Fleet Maintenance



The Fleet Crew consists of Matt Perry and Keith Whitney. Matt and Keith are responsible for maintaining the police fleet, including IPD patrol vehicles, investigator, motorcycle, ATV, and the Mobil Command Center. They also maintain the Town of Irondequoit's fleet, including the highway trucks, animal control, fire chief/assistant chief, mowers and snowblowers.

## IPD Accreditation



The New York Law Enforcement Accreditation Council currently sets 110 standards to be achieved and maintained by law enforcement agencies. After an initial successful review, agencies are re-evaluated every five years. At the December 2021 New York State Law Enforcement Agency Accreditation Council meeting, the Irondequoit Police Department was awarded accreditation once again. The Irondequoit Police Department was initially accredited in 1991 and has maintained this status since that time.

# SPECIAL SERVICES

## All-Terrain Vehicle Unit



All-terrain vehicles are used for patrolling special events, neighborhoods, and for conducting special investigations in remote areas. Vehicles can be transported by trailer to areas for rapid deployment. All operators receive specialized training.

## Bicycle Unit



The Bicycle Unit utilizes six bicycles outfitted for patrol. Bicycle patrols are used for special events, patrolling neighborhoods, and special investigations. They provide high visibility to the public at our parades and block parties. Officers assigned to the Bicycle Unit receive specialized training.

## Motorcycle Unit



The Motorcycle Unit consists of two motorcycles which are utilized for parades, special events, community events, traffic control, and special details. Motorcycle officers attend a two-week police motorcycle patrol training school for this type of duty.

# SPECIAL SERVICES

## Technical Services Unit

The Technical Services Unit is staffed with nine officers and is supervised by Sgt. Jason Murphy. Technicians provide the technical support for the department by collecting DNA samples, documenting and processing evidence, taking photographs, videos, and fingerprints, and testifying in court. All members of this unit must successfully complete special state-sponsored training schools for crime scene investigation. Technicians performed 661 tech assignments in 2021.

## Crisis Intervention Team

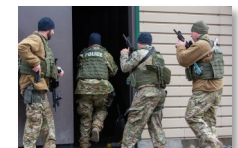


The Irondequoit Police Department has officers who are specially trained as Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) members. These officers have successfully completed a Crisis Intervention Training Program in conjunction with the Monroe County Office of Mental Health. This special skillset provides us with the necessary training to de-escalate a situation and offer consistent support to those individuals who are in need of such services. The partnership between the IPD and MCOMH also allows for opportunity wherein a certified mental health professional accompanies an IPD officer on a regular basis. This additional resource is utilized to assist with in-progress situations as well as the opportunity to conduct home visits with those who have had a crisis-related call for service. This specialized training for IPD officers and the additional resources offered by the Monroe County Office of Mental Health demonstrate our desire to work with individuals who are in need of services during a crisis situation.

## Training

The Irondequoit Police Department participated in 9,900 hours of training in 2021.

- Officers received a total of 9,547 hours of training.
- Included in this total is 337 hours of management training for 13 police supervisors.
- Civilian employees received a total of 353 hours of training.

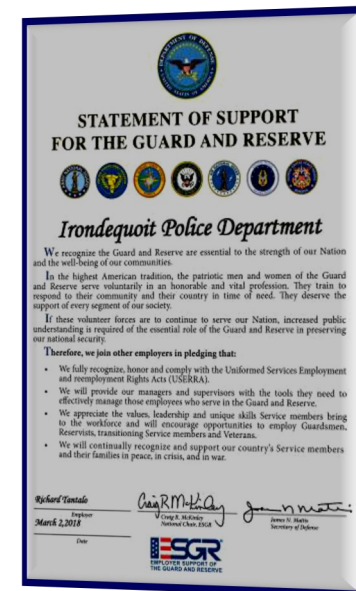


## Support of the Guard and Reserve
