February 21st, 2023

Irondequoit is proud to **Welcome Scott Peters** as the new Chief of Police!

The following excerpts appeared in a January 21st, 2023 article by the Democrat and Chronicle:

"Chief Peters, a Gates resident, spent more than 30 years in law enforcement, including 27 years with RPD. Peters joined the Rochester Police Department in 1992 and spent more than 11 years as an officer before he was promoted to sergeant in 2004, then to lieutenant in 2008. He also served for many years as the commanding officer of the department's SWAT team and served as a commanding officer for the Greater Rochester Area Narcotics Enforcement Team.

In 2019 he retired as RPD's deputy chief of operations. After retiring from RPD, he became a felony crimes investigator for the DA's Office. A graduate of the Aquinas Institute, Peters also graduated from Monroe Community College and the State University College at Oswego. He also graduated from the FBI National Academy.

Town Supervisor Rory Fitzpatrick said that he has the "utmost confidence" in Peters.

"His years of trusted leadership will be a great asset to the men and women of the police department, along with his strong commitment to keep our community safe," Fitzpatrick said.

Chief Peters says, "I am humbled to be given this opportunity and I look forward to serving the residents of Irondequoit," Peters said in a news release. "I have previously worked with many of the officers in the department and I look forward to working with them and using our combined talents focusing on public safety to make Irondequoit the best place to work and live for all." "





IPD Records Division

The Records Division is an integral part of the Irondequoit Police Department. The Records staff provides support to the officers, the Irondequoit Town Court, District Attorney's Office, DJCS, and many other entities that require assistance from the department.

They adhere to a high level of confidentiality, strict regulations, and must qualify to use law enforcement databases. They receive, enter, disseminate, file, and maintain criminal and vehicle information that is necessary to archive, and provide clerical support 14 hours a day, five days a week to the officers.

IPD Property Unit

In 2022, the Property Unit logged **1,873** items of non-agency property and evidence. **160** were drug/narcotic pieces and **138** were firearms. The Irondequoit Police Department Prescription Drug Drop Off Program also collected **889.7** pounds of prescription drugs. A wide variety of items were auctioned at our annual Police Auction in August yielding **\$3,652.95**, which was deposited into the Town Account. The IPD Property Unit deposited **\$18,965.20** of U.S. currency into the Town Account that was in the vault and deemed either abandoned or forfeited. A total of **373** items were returned to owners, including **\$2,168.88** of currency. The IPD Property Unit destroyed **837** items - including narcotics and weapons - at the Covanta Energy Incineration Facility in Niagara Falls.

IPD Accreditation



The New York Law Enforcement Accreditation Council currently sets 110 standards to be achieved and maintained by law enforcement agencies. After an initial successful review, agencies are re-evaluated every five years. At the December 2022 New York State Law Enforcement Agency Accreditation Council meeting, the Irondequoit Police Department was awarded accreditation once again. The Irondequoit Police Department was initially accredited in 1991 and has maintained this status since that time.

DEA National Take Back Day



The Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) National Prescription Drug Take Back Day events provide easy, anonymous opportunities to remove medicines in the home that are highly susceptible to misuse, abuse, and theft.

IPD partners with “**Uplift Irondequoit**,” a community based coalition that supports decreasing the prevalence of Drugs in our Community, to participate in this event which allows residents to properly dispose of unused drugs. At the event held in October, **270lbs** of unused medications were collected from residents for proper disposal! In total IPD collected almost **890lbs** of prescription drugs in 2022!



NARCAN Training for the Community

In 2022, IPD was able to provide NARCAN Training to the community. In the event of an overdose, quick response provides better outcomes for patients. If you have a loved one struggling with addiction to opioids, consider becoming trained on the use of NARCAN. “Take an hour, Save a Life.”

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT UNIT—PROGRAMS

National Night Out

The annual National Night Out rally is the Irondequoit Police Department's largest event. In 2022, was held at the Irondequoit Town Hall campus. National Night Out is a community event that promotes positive police-community relationships and enhances the relationships between neighbors and law enforcement. Local leadership, organizations, and first responder agencies attend the event to promote safety, crime prevention, and general well-being. Complimentary food was provided by Wegmans and dessert provided by Netsins Ice Cream. Truck. Sound system and Music provided by Legends 102.7.



Do the Right Thing Awards

The Do the Right Thing Awards program has been part of the Rochester Police Department (RPD) since 1995. The goal of Do the Right Thing is to foster positive relationships between local law enforcement and youth in the community. The Do the Right Thing Awards program recognizes youth for their bravery, courage and valor, such as volunteering, aiding law enforcement or other first responders, acts of heroism, leadership and positive role model behavior. The award distinguishes school-aged children who strive to make good choices, do well in school, give back to their community, or demonstrate an improvement in their behavior, and to publicly highlight these students and their stories in the media to show that good kids are newsworthy." The Irondequoit Police Department regularly attends awards ceremonies that feature students from Irondequoit schools.



E-Commerce Exchange

For residents who buy and/or sell items online, i.e. Facebook Marketplace and Craigslist, there are two parking spots reserved in front of the Irondequoit Police Department with security cameras that are monitored by a 24-hour security camera. This exchange zone will allow for safer transactions.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT UNIT - PROGRAMS

Bow Hunt Program

The Bow Hunt is an annual program to reduce the deer population in the Town of Irondequoit. The program occurs on days when school is *not* in session, and only occurs Monday thru Friday from sunrise until noon during the given dates that the program is open. In 2022, the ten-week campaign rendered the following:

- The season spanned from October 11th thru December 16th
- 90 archers in the program
- There are approximately 50 approved hunting sites
- 83 deer taken in the program in 2022



S.M.A.R.T. Camera Program (Surveillance, Mapping, and Reporting Technology)

With the proliferation of privately owned cameras such as the Ring, Nest, Eufy, and more, the Irondequoit Police Department has partnered with community homeowners & businesses in our community to share their camera footage should a crime occur nearby. Privately owned camera systems have proven invaluable to IPD's officers and investigators. Video obtained from these camera systems has helped the Irondequoit Police Department to identify suspects, vehicles, and other crucial pieces of evidence, leading to the successful clearance of many crimes.

Bicycle Officers

The Bicycle Unit utilizes two bicycles outfitted for patrol. Bicycle patrols are used for special events, patrolling neighborhoods, and special investigations. They provide high visibility to the public at our parades and block parties. Officers assigned to the Bicycle Unit receive specialized training.



Motorcycle Officers

The Motorcycle Unit consists of two motorcycles which are utilized for parades, special events, community events, traffic control, and special details. Motorcycle officers attend a two-week police motorcycle patrol training school for this type of duty.

All-Terrain Vehicle Officers

All-terrain vehicles are used for patrolling special events, neighborhoods, and for conducting special investigations in remote areas. Vehicles can be transported by trailer to areas for rapid deployment. All operators receive specialized training.



SPECIAL SERVICES

Technical Services Unit

The Technical Services Unit is staffed with TEN officers and is supervised by Sgt. Jason Murphy. Technicians provide the technical support for the department by collecting DNA samples, documenting and processing evidence, taking photographs, videos, and fingerprints, and testifying in court. All members of this unit must successfully complete special state-sponsored training schools for crime scene investigation. Technicians performed 567 tech assignments in 2022.

Crisis Intervention Team



The Irondequoit Police Department has officers who are specially trained as Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) members. These officers have successfully completed a Crisis Intervention Training Program in conjunction with the Monroe County Office of Mental

Health. This special skillset provides us with the necessary training to de-escalate a situation and offer consistent support to those individuals who are in need of such services.

The partnership between the IPD and MCOMH also allows for opportunity wherein a certified mental health professional accompanies an IPD officer on a regular basis. This additional resource is utilized to assist with in-progress situations as well as the opportunity to conduct home visits with those who have had a crisis-related call for service. This specialized training for IPD officers and the additional resources offered by the Monroe County Office of Mental Health demonstrate our desire to work with individuals who are in need of services during a crisis situation.

Special Events Volunteer Unit

Special Event Civilian Volunteers are a vital resource to the Irondequoit Police Department. Special Event Volunteers assist the Irondequoit Police Department and the community with special events throughout the Town of Irondequoit. A liaison officer from IPD is assigned to supervise and guide the activities of the civilians of the Special Events Unit and also to provide training throughout the calendar year. Training consists of conflict resolution, radio use and procedure, traffic control, crowd control, and officer safety, as well as other topics as deemed relevant by the department.

Police Chaplain Program

Father Joseph DeMaio and Father Don Wollschleger serve as chaplains to the Irondequoit Police Department. The IPD also partnered with the Flower City Chaplain Corps. Chaplains promote the safety and stability of the community by providing pastoral care to first responders. The chaplains also join IPD officers on ride-alongs, which provide an opportunity for conversation, support, and a means to learn about the role of a police officer in today's society.


CALLS FOR SERVICE STATISTICS

Below are some of the most common reasons for a Call for Service in 2022.



In addition, the Winter Parking Ordinance prohibits parking on all town roads between 12am and 9am from November 1st to April 15th. This allows our town plows to clear the roads in the winter without hindrance.
